SMoCA's exhibition *I Remember Not* Remembering presents 12 celebrated international artists who use personal home movies, photo albums and film footage as material for artworks.

Each work invokes a believable but questionable portrait of kinship, social change or personal tragedy.

Janet Cardiff (Canadian, b. 1957)
George Bures Miller (Canadian, b. 1960)

Janet Cardiff and George Bures Miller live and work in British Columbia. They are internationally recognized for immersive multimedia works that draw the viewer into unsettling narratives.

Their work has been included in numerous exhibitions such as the 19th Biennale of Sydney in 2014 and dOCUMENTA (13).

They represented Canada at the 2001 Venice Biennale and were awarded the Premio Prize and Benesse Prize.

Road Trip presents an impromptu conversation between the husband and wife as they examine Miller's family photographs and consider the limitations of imagery to convey or reveal truth.

This intimate work is about the relationship between the couple and the family histories which shape their identity. SMoCA has previously presented a piece by Cardiff and Miller in its 2014 exhibition *THE FIVE SENSES*. We borrowed Cardiff and Miller's seminal 2001 audio installation *The Forty Part Motet* from the Museum of Modern Art. The piece is a reworking of the 16th century choral composition "Spem in Alium" by English composer Thomas Tallis and includes 40 separately recorded voices played individually through 40 speakers.
